QUEEN ELIZABETH II WILDLANDS PROVINCIAL PARK

The Head Lake Dam is located within the boundaries of Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands Provincial Park. All structures in the park are under the jurisdiction of Ontario Parks.

There have been inquires about the management of Head Lake Dam.

A **hydrotechnical** study is being undertaken by Ontario Parks to understand the influence of the dam.

This study will help us to understand how the dam affects water levels on the lake.

Results will provide a baseline of information that will be used by Ontario Parks and made available to stakeholders to assist in decision making with respect to the future of the dam. Ontario Parks will communicate the results of this study and next steps once they are available.

Long term decisions will be made with formal consultation opportunities, for all stakeholders to participate.
